Volunteer Hours!

S ome of you may not know the importance of turning in your volunteer hours so here are some of the reasons!

Volunteer Hours are Important.

- Volunteerism is one of the most important activities Back Country Horsemen (BCH) can use to support our effort and mission of perpetuating enjoyable commonsense stock use in the backcountry. It helps keep trails open for all types of users – hikers, bikers, and, of course ,equines. It shows us as a good neighbor with the community, youth, and other user groups by ensuring that public lands remain open to recreational use.
- Volunteering is our clout. Legislators and land managers know that our volunteer hours are an asset and gives credibility to BCHW during discussions with them. Volunteers perform work that would not otherwise get done when government funding is cut.

BCHW Mission Statement

BCHW is affiliated with Back Country Horsemen of America (hereinafter "BCHA") and therefore adopts the BCHA mission statement as follows: The mission of this organization shall be:

- To perpetuate the common-sense use and enjoyment of horses in America's back country and wilderness.
- To work to insure that public lands remain open to recreational stock use.
- To assist the various governmental and private agencies in their maintenance and management of said resource.
- To educate, encourage and solicit active participation in the wise use of the back country resource by horsemen and the general public commensurate with our heritage.
- To foster and encourage the formation of new chapters in the state organization.



• Volunteering and recording those volunteer hours with your chapters and with the state gives BCHW Chapters an opportunity to participate in grant programs that can augment government funding cuts. Grants require "match," which can be cash or donated labor, materials

and equipment used to implement grant-funded projects. Most grants require at least a 1:1 match, which means that for every \$1 of grant funding we receive, we must also donate \$1 of "match." No volunteers = no grants! Your work party hours have the potential to be used as a match!

- Volunteering has a positive effect when talking with our partners. It shows that as a user group we take responsibility for keeping our public lands in good condition for future generations. It helps overcome negative opinions about sharing trails and enhances our image as stock riders on trails.
- Volunteering gives a sense of pride, brings a positive attitude to the chapter, and promotes teamwork by planning, building, and maintaining trails and trailheads.
- Volunteerism and Education is a big part of our organization from Leave No Trace classes, Saw Certification instruction, First Aid training and other equine-related programs.
- Without volunteers, trail workers and staff people alike, our organization wouldn't be what it is now.

Why Volunteer Hours Are Important

The Volunteer Hours and corresponding dollar amounts to those hours are reported on the annual IRS tax return, called the "990." The dollar amounts put a value on our many hours spent each year working on BCHW's mission statement. The importance of capturing ALL the Volunteer Hours that BCHW volunteers put in a year is to prove to the IRS we are a:

- 1. Bonafide non-profit.
- 2. Quite a few of the larger donors will look at the 990 to see how much time volunteers are devoting towards this non-profits mission.
- 3. Accurately reporting Volunteer Hours can also make going after larger NGO (non-government organization) grants much easier.

So, as President of BCHW, I am asking that we all log our volunteer hours and turn them into your chapter VH Chair or to the state!

The Coho Campground Saw Training

he Coho Campground Saw Training began in Brady, WA, on Jan. 20, 2024, for the Grays Harbor Chapter of BCHW. Eight students (six ladies and two men) spent eight hours in the classroom going over essential chainsaw safety training and saw maintenance.





After receiving permission from Brent Freeman, Recreation Shed Manager with the U.S. Forest Service, we held our field certification on Feb. 3, 2024, at the Coho Campground in Wynoochee, WA. All eight people returned to complete the field portion of the training to earn A, B, and C sawyer certification. Brent also provided permission to teach the A and B bucking certification and one falling C certification.

In talking with Brent, he mentioned that there were 146 "danger trees" he was trying to remove. He said the U.S. Forest Service was considering closing the campground if they could not get them fallen before Memorial Day.
