Leave No Trace Training

Reminder Seven Principles of LNT:

Plan Ahead & Prepare. Travel & Camp on Durable Surfaces. Dispose of Waste Properly. Leave What You Find. Minimize Campfire Impacts. Respect Wildlife. Be Considerate of Others.

"Backcountry" areas are those most often accessed by overnight users like backpackers, while "frontcountry" refers to places easily accessed by car, like city and state parks. Frontcountry is most often enjoyed by day-use visitors like dog walkers, picnickers and runners and those who are car camping. **Principle 1**: When you're poorly prepared, you're more likely to run into problems. Lack of good research can lead to situations where you can become fatigued or fearful, and you may be forced to make poor choices.



(LNT.org): A Guide to Minimum Impact Camping and Stock Use Techniques

Planning ahead includes doing research about your destination and packing appropriately.

Principle 2: When exploring your surroundings and setting up your picnic or overnight camp, seek out resilient types of terrain. Ideal durable surfaces include established trails and campsites, rock, gravel, dry grasses or snow.

so be one of the most destructive ones. Far better choices include a lightweight stove for cooking and a candle lantern for light. Stargazing is an excellent alternative, and is best enjoyed when your campsite is in total darkness.

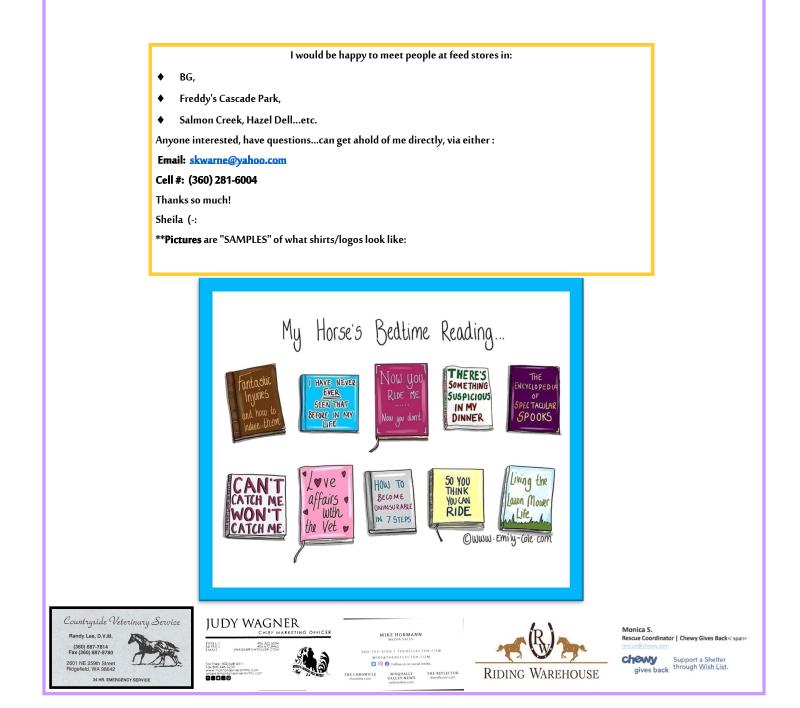
