The BCHW Board of Directors meeting was held in person in Ellensburg on the 18th. The elephant in the room was the approval of the rewritten by-laws and standing rules to reflect the new Executive Committee and it's operation. It was approved. The new by-laws and standing rules were posted in the last Trail Head News. This kicked into motion the need to reelect the current officers and approve the appointed positions. All of this was done. One of the big committee reports is the current members of the LNT committee are all resigning and new chair and members are needed if it is to keep going. Along that line BCHA is looking into developing their own Light on the Land program to reflect equine needs more than the LNT program does. The legislative chair is stepping down. Her personal job has changed and she no longer has the time to devote so BCHW is looking for a replacement. Teri Stark is looking for help with treasure duties. Things such as keeping track of credit card use and other things to lighten the work load on her.

There was discussion about having a Special Projects Coordinator. This would be for large work parties and other events that require lots of planning. Talk of changing the name to something else. If anyone is interested and has the skill set to do coordination contact Dana. A finance committee was formed and approved. Members are, Teri Stark, Dana Chambers, Tony Karniss, and Joe Remear.

Years ago the Alpine Lakes chapter dissolved and a \$1000 from their treasury was set aside if a new chapter was formed in the area of El-

lensburg. Since the Ellensburg chapter has been formed it was voted to give them the \$1000. A guidelines paper will be made up by Teri Stark and Ken Carmichael concerning chapter spending. There are chapters who are still spending money for things that are not allowed under the 501c3 rules and we need to clairify what can and cannot be spending money on. Leave No Trace Training (LNT.org): A Guide to Minimum Impact Camping and Stock Use Techniques

Principle number two of Leave No Trace: Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces

Plan Ahead & Prepare. Travel & Camp on Durable Surfaces.

- Dispose of Waste Properly.
- Leave What You Find.
- Minimize Campfire Impacts.
- Respect Wildlife.
- Be Considerate of Others.



It was a miracle that our class was under a tent for a couple days with us walking and trampling the grass without killing it. The staff had rolled out a special mesh carpet that allowed the ground to have minimum/no damage. Matter of fact, when we rolled it up at the end of class, we couldn't tell of our presence at all! This was truly a practice of Leave No Trace.

The most important concept for principle #2 is to avoid damaging the land. This is why you hear 'Please Stay on the Trail'. The trails are made so that activity stays away from plants/trees and protects them from getting destroyed. So next time you think that shortcut through the brush will save me time, think about all the effects on vegetation. Of course, this might not matter in a desert where its mostly a durable surface of rock, sand and gravel. When off-trail travel is necessary think about durability and frequency. Least durable and more frequently used routes will damage the land the most. Did you know it is recommended to use a bucket to water your horse from a river? If you let your horse walk into the water, it is disrupting the organic matter of that soil. Learn the difference between organic and inorganic soils to be more aware of how to protect it. Actually, ice and snow are good surfaces to travel on as long as it is safe.

Speaking of durable surfaces, lets talk about traveling over vegetation, cryptobiotic crust and desert puddles/mud holes. It is better to pick sparsely growing vegetation to walk on or dry vegetation. Wet vegetation gets disrupted easier. You can even find delicate flora and fauna in the desert. Cryptobiotic crusts are very delicate communities of organisms found in desert climates. They look blackish and raised and protect the moisture content of the soil. Also in the desert are mud holes and puddles that contain scarce resources for life. Please be careful not to step on these tiny precious creatures. Students got a chuckle when talking about best poop practices. It was recommended to smear poop on rocks as it dries and blows away faster. Haa haa haa, we got to say P O O P.

Another science to study is choosing a good camp site. This requires good judgement and information. This most important decision creates the biggest impact of the whole trip. Often the decision is a toss up between ecological and social effects to the environment. Please consider the fragility of the camp site as well as the wildlife disturbance and your group's potential to do more harm. It is recommended not to camp too close to the water or visible to others. This allows wildlife to make way to the water easier as well. Look for areas already impacted by previous groups so as not to harm the vegetation further. Be careful not to 'enlarge the area of disturbance'. For example, plan the setup of a kitchen or gathering spot so traffic is reduced. Please be sure to leave camp clean, attractive, and appealing to others. If we can lead by example, maybe we can teach others to do the same. All of our efforts will allow more years of use and enjoyment for everyone including your kids, grandkids and their kids.
