
NOTE: If you reach Cougar before turning auto the \$100 road, you've sone too far and missed the turn off.

DNR says 'free reservations'...with Discover Pass... There are some trail interruption's...as in logging going on...at least until July...but there are 'still 40 miles of trail open'. Closures mostly at the western boundary.

Follow the link <u>saharacreekcampreservations@gmail.com</u> for securing reservations...I plan on doing so directly. I talked to a 'Mr Simmons' of DNR recreation. **360-825-1631**. Skip all the 'canned info'...**go to O for operator**...ask for the Rec person for Shara HC...shud be Mister Simmons.

Reservations are available with a minimum of 3 DAYS and a maximum of 3 MONTHS notice. Requests outside of those parameters will not be considered. Reservations are not available over state holiday weekends. All campsites will be open the Thursday before until the Monday after a holiday on a first-come, first-served basis. All motor vehicles and trailers must have valid DOL registration. Each licensed motor vehicle must display a Discover Pass to camp in Sahara Creek Campground (towed trailers do not require a Discover Pass to be displayed). Sites 1-20 are equestrian camping only. Sites 21-30 are open to all non-ORV campers (equestrian campers included). Site 28 is a designated ADA campsite which requires a differently-abled DOL placard to camp in.



Escure Ranch from 25th to 29th of May, the Memorial Day weekend.

The equestrian camp was built through a partnership of BLM with the BCH, Ponderosa Chapter. The Escure Ranch is 12,000 acres open range, located roughly 25 miles south of I-90 at Sprague (Exit 245). Formerly a sheep ranch run by Basque sheepherders, the ranch contains a stretch of Rock Creek, including Towell Falls as riding destinations.

Some trails follow an old ranch road with views of the valley, basalt outcroppings, aspen, spring wildflowers, and native bunchgrass.

What you will find: concrete outhouse, equestrian water (no potable water), 10 corrals, highlines for 7 horses and a manure bunker. There is a wide open, large, flat area to camp, fire rings (bring wood). Since there are no trees bring your efence.

This is first come first serve, no reservations and on the long weekend it can be a bit more busy than usual. Ken Carmichael, BCH Ponderosa Chapter and BCHW committee chair most likely will be there that weekend also.

Directions: On state route 395 from Tri-Cities going North to Spokane, take exit 245, Sprague. Go south on WA-23 for 12.5 miles. Turn right onto Davis Road for another 7.0 miles, then turn left onto Jordan Knott Road. After 2.2 miles, on Jordan Knott, you'll arrive at a fork, stay right to stay on Jordan Knott for another 2.5 miles to arrive at the parking area.

Leave No Trace (LNT.org): A Guide to Minimum Impact Camping and Stock Use Techniques by Noelle Rodolari May 20, 2023

Principles of Leave No Trace: Get Ready For Horseback Riding this Summer

Plan Ahead & Prepare.
Travel & Camp on Durable Surfaces.
Dispose of Properly.
Leave What You Find.
Minimize Campfire Impacts.
Respect Wildlife.
Be Considerate of Others.



Enjoy the outdoors horseback without damaging the environment with these guidelines:

Heavy traffic on our public lands has polluted water sources, left blackened earth where campfires burned, trampled meadows, and littered the forests and open ranges with trash.

Planning: Lighten loads for you and your pack animals (one pack horse for three riders' gear). First, contact B.L.M. or U.S. Forest Service managers for details on regulations and trail conditions (maps). Look for public land where motorized use is prohibited (less crowded). Put some training time in at home to prevent problems. Condition your horse before a long trip. This will make the trip more enjoyable.

Packing: Try to pack light and lighten the load for your horse. Look for dual purposes in the gear you take. Ropes used for packs might double as high-lines. A pack horse 's load should be limited to 20 percent of his body weight (200 pounds for a 1,000-pound horse). Precooked food saves cook time. Measure and repackage portions and get rid of excess packaging. Don't forget a water filter. Bring feed for your horse. Pellets, cubes or grain can be fed in nosebags. Know requirements for weed-seed-free feed. Try lightweight gear and supplies.

Trail Etiquette: As a general rule, equestrians have the right of way on a trail. Be courteous. Keep your horse's head a safe distance from the horse in front of you (red ribbon in tail for kickers). Be supportive of your trail buddies for any short breaks. Warn riders behind you of obstacles. Stick to marked trails.

Campsite Selection: Use durable and level surfaces for tents. Try to place camps far from view, away from dead trees that could fall atop tents. You can find possible campsites by checking with BLM or USFS personnel. Stock Restraint: Use tree savers. Practice at home before you go on your trip or ask someone to show you. A high-line should about seven feet for a horse to cross beneath it. Please shovel dirt back in place if horse digs it out. Hobbles, picket lines, or portable corrals (tape more visible) can also be used. Move portable corrals to prevent overgrazing. Horses should be kept at least 200 feet from trails and water sources.

Fire: First, do you really need a fire. If you're cooking with a gas burner, you simply don't need one. Fire sterilizes the ground below it, use barrier. Fires can be built on Kevlar fire blanket (or aluminum). Fire rings—rock circles —might already be in place, please use these. A Kevlar fire blanket (clean oil pan or several layers of aluminum foil), folded to about 4 feet square is good.

Souvenirs: The Archaeological Resources Protection Act and National Historic Protection Act forbid the removal of cultural artifacts. (arrowheads, pottery, or jewelry, cultural or historic value). Fossils and deer antlers, and other parts of the natural ecosystem, also should be left where they're found. Take a picture instead.

Breaking Camp: Run a stick over the ground flattened by your campsite and horse area, in effect erasing your presence by scattering pine needles and cones over the site. Pack out manure and keep it away from water sources. Replace materials where you found them. Plan on packing out your garbage, including food scraps.
