From our Director



Hello all

I attended the BCHW Board of Directors meeting on the 16th. There was a big agenda and it

took from 9am to 3pm to cover it all. That said having the Executive Committee handling the day to day business has made the rest of the directors job easier. Here goes the run down of topics.

BCHW Leadership training will be in January. Date to be announced. It will be a Zoom meeting to avoid driving over passes in winter weather. Anyone can attend Leadership training. It will give you some insight as to the duties of different offices and committees. I'll be posting the meeting info when I have it.

BCHW has been approached to help out with booth fees for fairs and community events that promote BCHW and it's chapters. Exc. Committee decided BCHW could pay half of the fees up to \$250.

Teri Stark is asking for more help with Rondezvous. She needs people/chapters to sign on. If anyone wants to help or put together a group to help I can find out where she needs it.

BCHA is working on the issue of e-bikes on non-motorized trails. They are working with partners and land agencies.

It's time to start looking at chapter members who we think are deserving of awards. Let Brian Jansen or me know if you have someone who you think is deserving.

The keeping of records of the chapters and states activities is getting more and more important. If the IRS does an audit of the books they will be dealing with the state level officers but what the chapters do will be a part of that since we are all part of BCHW. Ken Carmichael sits on the board for Riverside Park at Spokane. He reported that they were audited and it took the IRS 2 ½ days to cover everything. That was for a budget of \$42,000. BCHW'S budget is over \$700,000. This includes grants. So it's very important that we all

keep good records of our expenditures and activities

Speaking of grants. Last year BCHW had \$124,000 in RTP grants. Next year we are on track to receive \$270,000 in RTP grants.

Jeff Chapman has been appointed the committee position of Legislative Chair

Dana wants to start a data base that tracks work parties and the land agencies who are involved. We are to send her the information from our work.

BCHW voted to approve BCHA'S request to increase dues. If a majority of states approves it, it will take effect for 2024 dues. BCHW will have to decide by June 2024 if we will also increase our dues.

The Exc. Committee has been assigned the duty of writing an NSF check policy. At the tack sale this year there was an NSF check that we have not been able to collect on yet. It has been turned over to a collection agencies.

Remember we are having a work party on Oct. 7th to brush out the Fossil Trail. Let me know if you can attend. If you want to ride your horse that's okay. You may be asked to start from the Blue Lake Trailhead to come up from the bottom of the slope. We will be using brush cutters, loppers, hand saws and possible chain saws. Bring your lunch, drinks and favorite brushing tools. I'll have some extra loppers. Ken, don't forget Twiggy!!





Leave No Trace Training

(LNT.org): A Guide to Minimum Impact Camping and Stock Use Techniques

1. How to Put Out a Campfire

Did you know that 85% of wildfires are caused by humans? \$3.1 billion was spent in 2018 for fire suppression. This is why it is so important to make sure your fire is totally out. The best way to put out a fire is to make campfire soup. First, let the fire burn completely out. Then, drown it with water. Stir it up. Finally check it for heat by placing your hand over top of it.

2. How to Share the Trail

Our trails are for everyone, and there are some ways to minimize our impacts while sharing these spaces. Please stay on the trail to avoid damaging vegetation or creating erosion. Sometimes it is necessary to step off trail during some encounters. Hike in single file to prevent widening the trail and allowing space for others. Yielding occurs when going in opposite directions. Use the yield triangle where bicycles yield to all, hikers yield to horses, horses are least predict-

able and don't have to yield to either. We know to be safe it can be more polite to yield sometimes. Downhill hikers yield to uphill hikers. If going faster than people in front of you, ask politely if OK to pass. When past them, it is considered polite to say THANK YOU. If you have a dog, it is more considerate to put on leash to pass others. By being kind and considerate we can all enjoy and share the trails.

3. How to Go to the Bathroom Outside

Human waste can be hugely impactful to natural spaces and those who visit after us. With some restrooms still closed, now is the time to learn about going to the restroom outside. Since pee is mostly sterile, we don't have to dig a cat hole, but we still need to keep it from water sources. Pee 200 ft (70 steps) away from water sources, trails, camps or other high traffic routes. Studies have found pharmaceuticals in alpine lakes from people peeing too close to the water. It is OK to pee where the high rate flow of water is Over 500 CFS (cubic feet per second). Its better to pee on rocks other than vegetation since animals are attracted to the salt in the urine and can dig up vegetation. Toilet paper can be packed out as it can take a year to decompose. Solid waste also had guidelines: avoid pollution of water sources, avoid someone finding it, minimize spreading disease and maximize rate of decomposition. Use the bathroom if available. Dig cathole if possible. Pack out solid waste if nowhere else to safely dispose of it.

4. How to Plan Your Trip

Planning is a crucial part of any trip. Things change so being prepared is very important. Check the internet for blogs and park information. Be prepared for the unexpected like closed toilets or lack of trash receptacles.

5. Car Camping 101

There are many tips to set up camp if car camping. Put tent on a durable surface. The spicket is not the kitchen sink. Use bucket to wash dishes, strain particles into trash and toss grey water 200 ft from camp. Don't burn trash that has harmful chemicals. Keep food protected in bearproof containers. Pick up trash and pack it out. Enjoy your adventures and hope to see you out there.
