VET NOTES Sharon Hoofnagle D.V.M. Barefoot vs Shoeing

The following article is from TheHORSE magazine. April 22. 2022 It is based on communication with Göran Åkerström, D.V.M.

FEI Veterinary Director. Dr Åkerström lives in Switzerland. It is an excellent unbiased article.

The Smart Horse Owner's Guide To Bare Feet

The barefoot sport horse trend is a good one, Åkerström said. But riders must tread with caution.

"Each case needs to be evaluated individually," he said. "You really need to consider each horse and his discipline, and you need to manage the case and give it enough time. And you need to be very, very observant on how to manage that horse in the best way. You will find that, quite often, it depends on the horse and how much and of what quality hoof he has, how quickly it grows back, the footing, and so on."

Our sources say successful competitive barefoot riding requires:

Skill. The farrier and the veterinarian must be open-minded and well-trained in barefoot horse health, from evidence-based trimming techniques to a keen eye for subtle lameness.

Time. Give the horse's feet ample time, usually several months, to adjust to working barefoot—especially if the feet were shod previously.

Genetics. Did the parents have good feet? Select for horses that appear to have the genes for high-quality hooves. **Nutrition**. Horses can't grow good hooves without a healthy, well-balanced diet.

Environment. Strong hooves develop in more natural environments where horses can move around over varied terrain, rather than standing for hours with their feet in feces or urine-soaked bedding.

Discernment. Even if the horse's feet look great, some situations and terrain call for extra protection, whether metal or plastic shoes, a layer of adhesive resin, or removable boots.

Humility. A horse's health and welfare are more important than the rider's pride. If going barefoot doesn't work, it's time to step back and use shoes—at least temporarily, while figuring out the next steps.

"For both performance and welfare, you have to evaluate each case individually," Åkerström said. "And always, of course, with a focus on equine welfare as your No.1 priority."

WBCH General Meeting Minutes April 13 2022 Laurel Grange

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 by Cindy P. The Pledge of Allegiance was said.

Sunshine: Michelle M.- cards were sent out

Volunteer hrs.: Verna M.- we had 106.5 hrs. for March

Treasurer: Tim V. – balances were read. (members can request balances).

Cindy has given up her credit card and square to Tim. Tim, Joe, and Fran also have credit cards.

Directors: Bill M: legislative- the re-organization of the state is nearing completion. The executive committee is close to being established. The details will be published in the May Trailhead News.

The concept and by-laws and standing rules will be voted on at the state level in June.

Bill gave some history. Our system will be following the BCHA format (established years ago by Mike McGlenn) Five directors will communicate with us. This will simplify our contact with public land managers. They want one point of contact. Kathy Young will represent public lands at the state level. One of our biggest issues is the lack on contact between chapters. Kathy will be a good contact. Point of contact is also important for grants.

We have several new people at the forest service.

Work is needed at Schreiber's, Excelsior, and Pioneer Camp (route to Elbow Lake). An engineer is being sent in to plan the road repairs to Pioneer Camp.

Hot Shot funds. Tim V.- Jason Ridlon has clarified on how funds can be spent. One of our primary issues is lack of parking. Some options for spending funds are Pine and Cedar, Larrabee by the maintenance sheds (Clayton Beach parking), and the Silver Lake parking loop. There is \$12,600 available. Permits and flagging expenses are also appropriate for Hot Shot funds. Tim described using cash as leverage. We have 12 months to spend the money but that started in Nov 2021.

We need to spend the money or have a solid plan for next year. It is a two-year cycle.

RCO funds However we need to spend RCO funds first (forest service lands only). The next RCO grant application is this fall. Rocky suggested hiring a crew for Goat Mt and Skyline work. RCO funds cannot be spent on roads. A list had been sent out on proposed projects. We need to prioritize.

Work Parties: Roger N- only wp planned is for National Trails Day. The DNR arranges for help from Whidbey Island Naval Station.

Packing: Rocky- nothing new for packing. Rocky is willing to teach packing at Vedder, will ask to have a notice put in the newsletter. Tim noted that packing is a skill set that is disappearing.

Trailheads

Vedder: issue of vehicles parking in trailer areas. Roger talks to folks and leaves notes on vehicles. Signage is planned. It was requested that signs not be put on trees.

Y Rd: Bill M and Sharon H rode with Hyden from the DNR, Arlyn from WTA and Eric from the Whatcom Mountain Bike Coalition up the logging roads and viewed the new logging sites. Arlyn and Eric are with groups that can contract with the DNR. BCH is not. They will be scouting out the new trails once logging is completed. We have asked to be kept informed of plans.

Silver Lake: there are plans to remodel one barn by removing the tie stalls and install steel corrals. However, the number of stalls will be decreased. There are currently 36 tie stalls but there are issues with them. We may be able to get 16 steel corrals in. There is also a plan for a gravel road, highlines, and camp spots around the meadow. There are plans to build more trails connecting to Maple Falls

Auction: Melinda S- deadline for value letters is April 16. Drop off items at Nancy's 4/24 through 5/6- call her first. Tagging is on 5/7. Sign-up sheets to work are being sent around. Two more people are needed in the office. We need people to transport items from Nancy's to the auction.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn. Meeting adjourned at 8:20. Sharon Hoofnagle secretary




